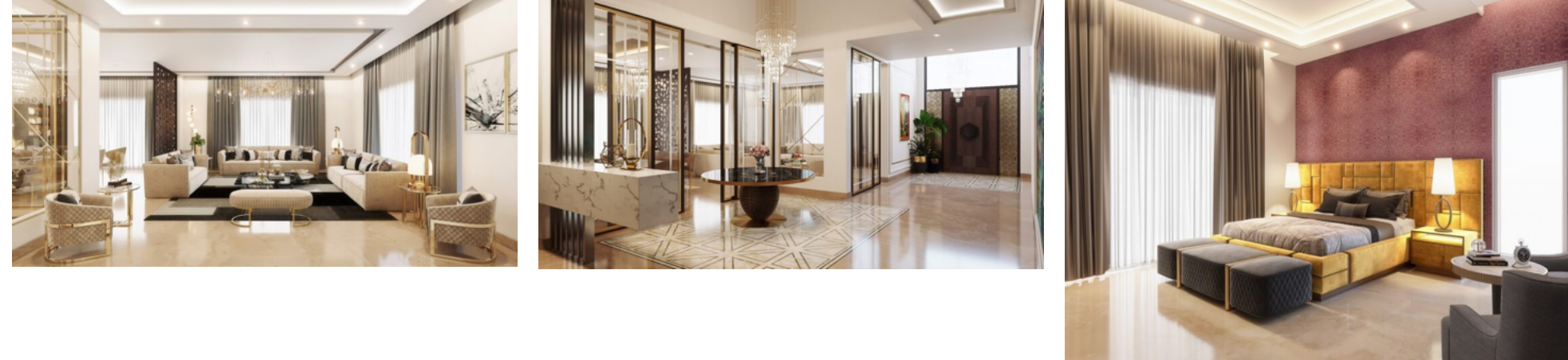
MOI DEN INTERIORS

1.Sustainable Materials

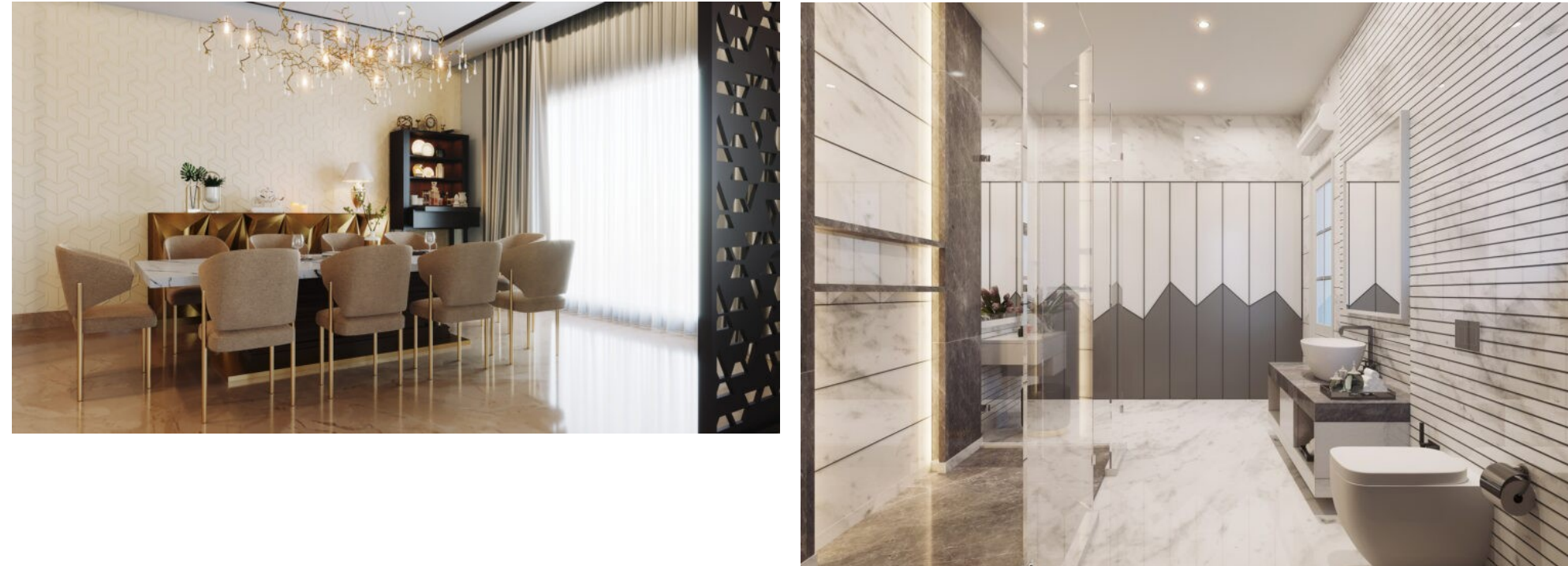

2.Biophilic Design

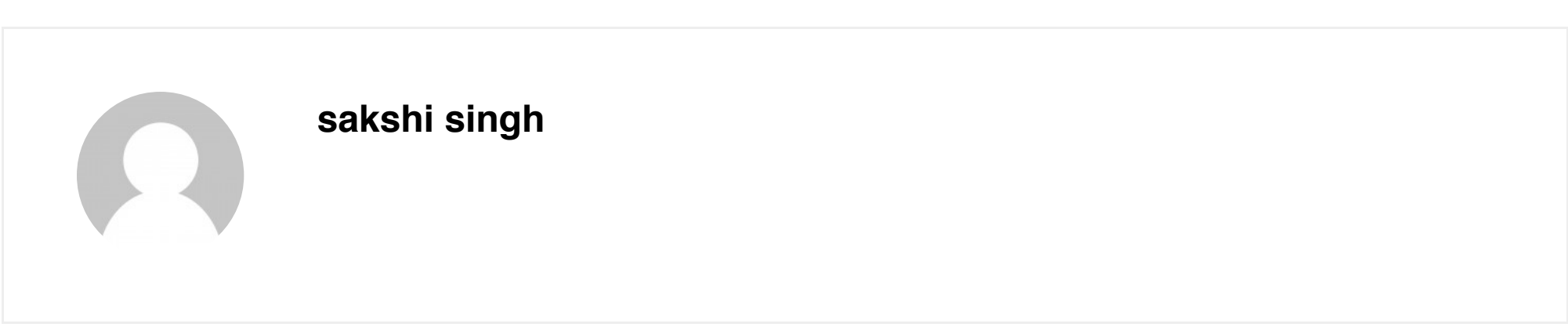
Research shows that connecting with nature has a positive effect on our psyche and overall mental wellbeing. There is a gravitation towards designs that incorporate nature in our homes.

3.Multifunctional Spaces.

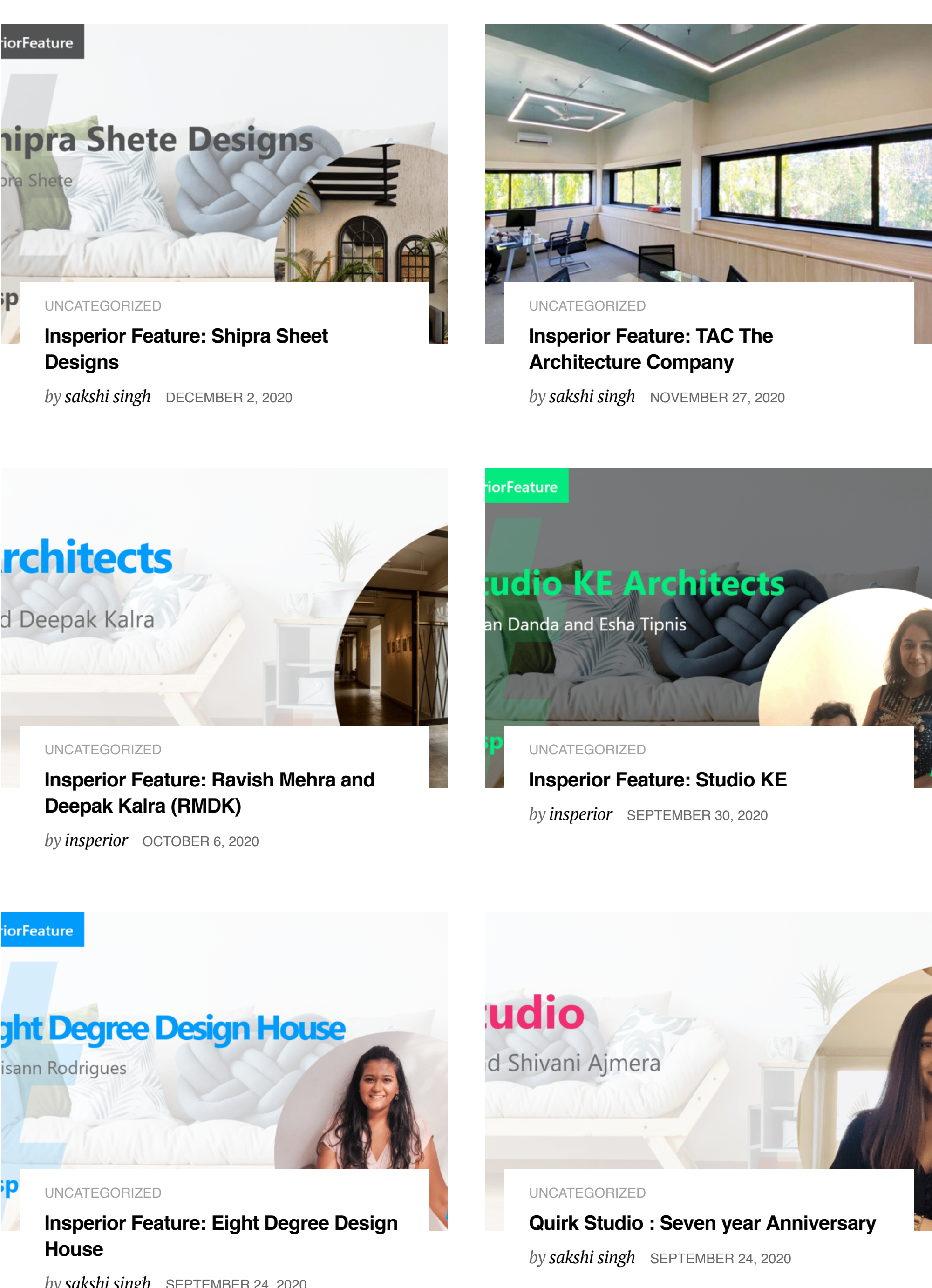
With households experiencing remote working and learning at home, spaces should be designed keeping in mind that the spaces are multifunctional in nature.
